Marlene and Byron can feel very good about the multitude of compliments they received from our members.

Mr. R.E. "Ted" Turner, our 1987 LA-PSR honoree, belies the image of the hard-hitting and hard-hearted American entrepreneur. Dressed casually with desert boots and an open collared sports shirt, he completely won the sympathy and understanding of the audience with personal reflections of his life and the dramatic changes in his personal perceptions of societal values.

He is the President of Turner Broadcasting System, which owns and operates Superstation WTBS and Cable News Network (CNN), among other enterprises. There is another side to this successful businessman. As a humanitarian he is concerned with conditions under which we live as well as the shadow of war, especially nuclear war, which threatens us all. Mr. Turner has done more than recognize the threats to the human condition — he has had the courage to act upon his convictions.

Ted Turner conceived and founded The Better World Society, the non-profit organization whose goal is to produce and distribute television programming on issues concerned with the survival of the planet. In partnership with the Soviet Union, Mr. Turner created the Goodwill Games. Despite the excellence of this sports event, it has been rumored that he lost a good deal of money on this enterprise.

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Quarterly Meeting: Bill Press

Where can one find a commentator on t.v. who has an open mind and dissenting opinion? In Los Angeles, it seems that there is only one person who we can look to and that is Bill Press on KABC-TV.

Bill is not one concerned about whose toes he steps on when he is convinced of the correctness of his position. So, when he accepted our invitation to speak at our dinner meeting, we knew the evening would be exciting.

Bill Press came from a quiet world of French studies at Niagra University. He then entered a seminary for religious studies and was a high school teacher in San Francisco. Then came the Vietnam War; Press was drawn into the political process while working on the Eugene McCarthy campaign to stop that terrible war.

Mr. Press is an Emmy award winning political commentator for KABC-TV Los Angeles and KGOT-TV San Francisco. Every evening for seven years Press has provided the City of the Angeles with incisive observations about our politicians and their policies. In addition to this daily commentary he produced several special programs for the Channel 7 News on such items as the pollution of the Santa Monica Bay, the war in Nicaragua, and the world of Armand Hammer. Bill Press has been nominated for an Emmy award for his work at KABC-TV each year from 1981-1986, garnering the award in both 1982 and 1986 for new commentary.

Before beginning his career in television Press was deeply involved in California politics, working on environmental and political issues. He served as Chief of Staff for Senator Peter H. Behr between 1971 and 1973, and in 1975 he was appointed Director of Policy by California Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr., a position he held until 1979.

This strong background in California politics lends strength to many of Press' comments, comments which might be considered radical if uttered by a less knowledgeable man. At the dinner he

Physicians For Social Responsibility Introduces The PSR Mastercard

PSR is now offering all members and supporters the opportunity to apply for the new PSR Mastercard. Each time a PSR member or supporter uses their PSR Mastercard to make a purchase, PSR receives a royalty based on 1/2% of all purchases — at no additional cost to the cardholder.

Some of the terms of the PSR Mastercard: 1) there will be no annual fee for the first year of card use, an annual fee of \$15.00 will be charged in subsequent years; 2) all cardholders will enjoy the competitive interest rate of 17.5%; 3) there will be an interest-free grace period of 25 days on all purchases.

The PSR Mastercard will be issued through First Financial Savings Association of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. First Financial has an investment portfolio which emphasizes "social responsibility".

If only 20% of PSR's members and supporters use the PSR Mastercard, an additional \$250,000 income could be received by PSR throughout the course of a year. This program will potentially provide Physicians for Social Responsibility with a very steady source of income.

Telephone Tree Launched Successfully!

How can LA PSR use its resources to make an impact on national policy? An unprecedented number of responses came to our appeal to you to take another step in preventing nuclear war by joining us in writing and calling our national legislators in favor of arms control! We are excited to have this new way to mobilize our doctors and friends to help our cause, and the telephone tree appeals to our busy members because it can be done in a short time.

We now have over 100 people in our phone tree. When we monitor a crucial vote on arms control in the Congress, we mobilize the six branches of the telephone tree, and soon 100 or more phone calls and letters go to key legislators.

Our LA PSR Telephone tree was launched on September 14, 1987 when the Senate considered the Defense Authorization Act for 1988. Members were asked to write or call Senators Cranston and Wilson to urge them to support the strict interpretation of the A.B.M. Treaty and a Soviet-U.S. moratorium on the testing of nuclear weapons over one kiloton.

On October 2, 1987, the Senate passed the full Defense Authorization Act for 1988 which included not only the preservation of the A.B.M. Treaty, but also, the preservation of the SALT II Treaty. In

short, *we won!* Unfortunately, the nuclear test ban was rejected by the Senate, but there's still hope for it since it succeeded in the House earlier.

One month later the tree was activated for the second time around the issue of limiting the funding for SDI and nuclear weapons testing.

When our legislative efforts are coordinated with those of other arms control organizations, we can make a remarkable impact on National policy. As John Tirman wrote for the Los Angeles Times on September 24, 1987: "What the peace movement has done in this decade is to democratize this process. Operating on a fraction of the budgets of Pentagon and defense-industry lobbyists, these activists have given voice to the hopes of ordinary Americans, have demanded of officialdom a reasonable armistice and, perhaps most remarkably, have affected the perceptions and behavior of the Soviet leadership. The peace community is now a permanent fixture in the constellation of American politics, emitting its own light and exerting a powerful gravitational force."

So, friends, we are becoming like a law of nature in our efforts to save Nature from human nature. May the force be with us!

"SARCOPHAGUS": A Nuclear Tomb

"We thought it could never happen here," said Vladimir Stepanovich Gubaryev, in reference to the devastating explosion in Reactor No. 4 at Chernobyl. Gubaryev, science editor for "Pravda", was the first reporter at the nuclear power plant, one of the scientific community who had "tragically believed that such accidents could not occur. Chernobyl changed those perceptions completely."

Upon his return to Moscow Gubaryev enclosed himself in his home. One week later he emerged, and "Sarcophagus" had been written. The play's fictional characters are based on interviews Gubaryev conducted with Chernobyl's heroes, villains and victims. The setting is an experimental wing in a fictional radiation clinic where the victims' stories emerge as their lives end.

A special performance of "Sarcophagus" will be held at 8:00 PM on December 4th at the Los Angeles Theatre Center. This fundraiser for the L.A. Theatre Center is being coordinated by Los Angeles Physicians for Social Responsibility and co-sponsored with WSP, WAND, ADPSR, Voters to End the Arms Race, Hollywood For SANE, ESR, and Ploughshares.

Bill Bushnell, Artistic Producing Director of the Los Angeles Theatre Center, says, "this is not just another play. 'Sarcophagus' is a universal cry for nuclear sanity." For ticket information call the LA PSR office, (213) 458-2694.

Students For Peace

The youth of the 80's has generally been looked upon as apathetic and uninterested in anything that does not concern their path toward material wealth. Yet all of today's youth know that the threat of nuclear war is a reality. Many believe that a worldwide nuclear catastrophe will occur in their lifetime and others believe it will occur in a few hundred years, but few believe that it won't happen at all. Therefore, the young people are again beginning to unite, working for an end to the nuclear threat throughout the world.

Last spring, at the IPPNW 7th World Congress in Moscow, Pauline Saxon attended a small conference given by four teenagers from Montreal, Canada. These students described how they dedicated one year of their lives (before starting college), to speaking in Canadian high schools about the nuclear threat. Their premise was that their generation is the future. However, there will be no future with nuclear weapons. It became apparent that teenagers must educate themselves and work toward nuclear disarmament. This '86'87 tour across Canada was called the Youth Disarmament Tour (YDT). By the tour's end these four teenagers had spoken to one out of every twenty students in Canada.

Pauline left the conference, determined to bring one of the four to Los Angeles. She contacted Madeline Schwab of Crossroads School and proposed that students from Crossroads organize a meeting of interested high school students from around Los Angeles to meet with Seth Klein, one of the YDT's co-founders.

The weekend of October 25-26 fifty students from more than ten L.A. County schools came to the LA PSR office to participate in Seth's two day seminar. The seminar focused on how to educate yourself and others on the nuclear threat. Seth, 19, described how he and his three friends had planned their national tour. He encouraged the students to discuss some of the obstacles they would face, and what possible solutions there would be when founding a peace group on campus. Seth ended the seminar with an outline of ways to make an effective presentation.

The weekend culminated with a commitment from thirty students, from various L.A. schools, to begin a productive L.A. Youth Peace Group.

The first meeting of this new group was held on November 8th at the LA PSR office. There was an overwhelming turnout. The twenty dedicated students in the group have decided that there will be no president or chairperson, but that everyone will take an active leadership role. Various projects were discussed: making schools nuclear free zones; planning an educational tour (like the YDT), across California; and organizing speaking engagements in their own students. The group decided that its main purpose should be one of education. Many students never get past the Korean war in history classes. It is our hope to educate ourselves on the nuclear threat, so that we can educate others.

Many Los Angeles schools already have some form of a peace group or current events group on campus. However, most schools put limitations on what can be done in these groups. Our new youth group hopes to attract members of already existing school groups, and to provide an uncensored atmosphere where L.A. youths can plan projects and events that educate other teenagers. Our group plans to make a clear statement against the continuation of the nuclear arms race. We are the future, therefore it is our responsibility to clean up the mess that has been left behind.

spoke out against the Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) and expressed his support for the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty. Press also lauded the efforts of the peace and social justice community, crediting our unrelenting pressure on the government for the approaching INF summit. He warned us to not relax our efforts, reminding us that the INF treaty will only account for 4% of the combined U.S./Soviet nuclear arsenal. Press also spoke out against our military commitments with West Germany and Japan, stating that America's strength is in its economic power not in the military. Our policies, he stated, are based on our thinking of 1945. We are now in 1987, and the world has changed.

views. At the garden party he recounted how his father indoctrinated him in morbid anti-communism as well as other stereo-typical thinking. Through his own intelligence and life experience he has developed a totally new way of looking at the world. His main concerns about survival are the threats of over-population, environmental degradation, and nuclear war.

In his speech Turner outlined several new programs which CNN is developing, all of which are designed to further understanding between the U.S. and Soviet people. The first is a program on the Soviet Union, a portrait of a people, society, and culture. This special is a follow-up on a similar series CNN already produced and aired on the American people. Also in the works is what Turner described as a "global forum", a weekly broadcast on CNN during which every nation has the opportunity to present, through their eyes, the top two news items of the week. This type of programming cuts to the core of our differences, demonstrating how the world appears from another perspective, giving us knowledge which might help us to understand those points of view.

All of these examples reflect the pledge Mr. Turner has taken to aid in the development of an improved world understanding. It is this conviction that caused our chapter of PSR to honor him.

Speaking without notes and in a highly personal way, Mr. Turner completely won the hearts of his audience. Following his speech, he was besieged by well-wishers and questions.

We hope that others, convinced that nuclear arms protect us, can and will follow Mr. Turner's example and begin to think in new ways.

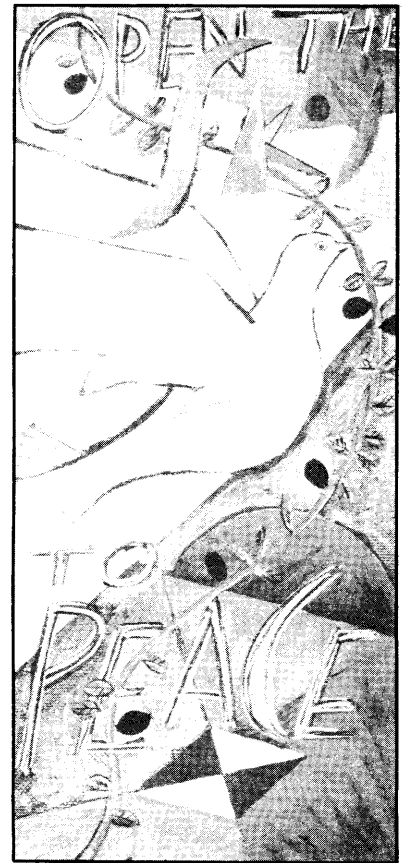

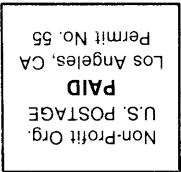
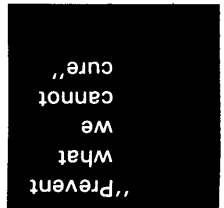
